Reflection

In many ways, it is fair and just that the world does not operate the divine logic demonstrated in the gospel. Employers should *not* work like the landowner in this parable. A job that paid the same amount for an evening of labor as for a backbreaking dawn-to-dusk day world be what we call a toxic workplace. But the kingdom of heaven does not work like earth; the generosity that awaits us there is beyond our wildest dreams.

He Calls Us Friends

[The landowner] paid them all the same!

Of course, the first ones hired protested. This was impossible; had they not worked ten times as much?

According to human practice, justice did not seem to have been done. . . .

It was, but in a different way. With one word, Jesus changed the whole scene in today's story. The landowner does not treat his workers as servants, not even as sisters or brothers. The landowner addresses them in another way; he calls them *friends*.

We are accustomed to calling one another sisters and brothers in Jesus' name. In Jesus' name, didn't he tell us that we all have one Father, our Father in heaven? And aren't we all formed from the same Mother: God's earth? Aren't we descendants from the same ancestors: Adam and Eve?

Yet Jesus hardly ever calls us brother or sister, only once, maybe twice. He called us, very explicitly, *friends*.

You can have a brother and not be his friend; you can have a sister and not love her at all. To be blood related is no guarantee of love or respect. The Bible is full of that type of relationship: Abel and Cain, Isaac and Ishmael, Jacob and Esau, Joseph and his brothers.

It was not for nothing that Peter had to ask, "How often do I forgive my brother?"

He calls us friends!

Of course, he is our brother, but what is nicer than having your brother as a friend or being the friend of your sister?

It is that relationship that changes all, even today's story. What a friend we have in Jesus!

As for the rest, aren't we all like workers who started at the very last hour?

To the People of Holy Cross Parish FAREWELL

As the termination dust gets lower and lower on the mountains, Diane & I begin to plan for our trip South for the winter. In that sense, this year is no different from the 20+ years that we have been "snow birds", we will leave on September 30th. However, this time it IS different, since we will be leaving Alaska for good. We will not be flying back in the spring as snow birds, but will become permanent residents of Arizona.



It has been our pleasure to serve in this parish for the past 31 years. We arrived in Anchorage in June of 1992, being transferred from Memphis, TN, by Federal Express (FedEx) to fly as a Captain on the MD-11. I was assigned to Holy Cross in October of that year, as a Deacon to assist Fr. Ernie Muellerleile, the founding pastor of the parish. Mass was still being celebrated in the store front in the postal plaza. Soon after, we moved into the church here on Lore Road.

Together, Fr. Ernie, Sr. Joan Oberle, Diane & I, formed the first RCIA team and welcomed many new members into the parish community. We have served in the parish under numerous pastors & administrators: Fr. Ernie, Fr. Dan (multiple times), Fr. Ben, Fr. Joseph, Fr. Andrew, and many more, and now Fr. Pat. I have also served in the Tribunal at the pleasure of four archbishops: A/B Francis Hurley, A/B Emeritus Roger Schwietz, A/B Paul Etienne, and Archbishop Andrew Bellissario.

I was blessed to be able to assist at the altar, to preach the Word of God, to baptize many of your children, to witness many of your wedding vows, and, sadly, to assist at many funerals of your loved ones, including Fr. Ernie and Sr. Loretta. But now it is time to move on. Happily for you, Deacon Sandon and Sharlet are here to serve the diaconal needs of the parish as the latest Deacon Couple, as Fr. Ernie would always say. Hopefully more men and women from the parish will follow in their footsteps. Two couples are already in diaconate formation from the parish.

In Arizona, we will continue to be a part of our parish of All Saints in Mesa, and I will continue to function as a Judge in the Tribunal for the Diocese of Phoenix. Our daughter, Cindy, whom many of you have known over the years, will remain in Anchorage, in an assisted living home, near Our Lady of Guadalupe, where she is well established. She will be our ongoing link to Alaska, since we plan to spend time with her on a regular basis throughout the year. We hope to see many of you when we return on those visits.

And so it is with great sadness that we bid farewell to all the many friends that we have made here at Holy Cross over the years. We will keep you, the priests, the deacon couple(s), and all the staff in our prayers. May God continue to Bless Holy Cross Parish.






Drinking with the Saints: Fri Sep 29, 6pm

Michael Foley offers the faithful witty and imaginative instruction on the appropriate libations for the seasons, feasts, and saints' days of the Church year.




